




Journalist

 Journalists investigate and write stories and features for broadcasting and for newspapers, magazines and other periodicals.

 0.76% fall in employment over the next 5 years.

 Typically working 37 - 40 hours per week including evenings and weekends.

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- Selects material for broadcast or publication, checks style, grammar, accuracy and legality of content and arranges for any necessary revisions.
 - Writes articles and features and submits draft manuscripts to newspaper, magazine, periodical or programme editor.
 - Determines subject matter and undertakes research by interviewing, attending public events, seeking out records, reviewing written work, attending film and stage performances etc.

 Typically working 37 - 40 hours per week including evenings, weekends and bank holidays.

 - Finding studio audiences and programme contributors looking for locations.
 - Researching and writing content for websites and social media.
